

Keep Milton's water clean and healthy.

- Bag up raked leaves or lawn clippings in paper bags to be collected by the town.
- Consider composting yard waste. Compost bins are available at the Milton DPW.
- If using mowed/chopped leaves as mulch, keep leaves back a few feet from edge of pavement.
- Ensure that your lawn service is properly disposing of yard waste.
- Reduce excessive lawn chemical use. Use organic products, if necessary.

When streams, rivers, and ponds receive too much phosphorus, harmful algae and cyanobacteria blooms can occur. These blooms are unsightly and can be toxic to people, pets, and wildlife.
